Course description:

This is a preparatory course for all students who want to take the Navajo Nation Bar Exam. The students will review all Navajo bar outline materials pertinent to the exam. Examination of past bar exams will be undertaken to familiarize students with the content and format of the exam. Repeatedly taking past bar exams is a must. By applying the

IRAC method of lawyer thinking, students will learn to spot legal issues in fact patterns, state the legal issues and analyze the application of the law to facts to draw a legal conclusion.

Finally this course will adhere to the university's commitment to providing a student-oriented learning environment based on the Dine' philosophy of education: Nitsahakees, Nahat'a, Iina'a, and sihasin.

<u>Learning outcome and assessment</u>: Upon successful completion of the course, the students will:

- Understand the purpose of reviewing, taking and passing the Navajo bar exams. Measurement
- o Understand purpose of taking the Navajo bar exam. Measurement
- Learn how answering law essay questions require that legal claims must be supported by relevant facts. Measurement:
- Understand how issues, rules of law, analysis and conclusion works as a lawyer's method of thinking on bar exams. Measurement
