The fair brought together several groups and programs, including Presbyterian, Navajo Nation TB Control Program, Tse' Hoo tsooi' Medical Centers Family Advocacy Center, and more. Attendees could collect various swag items to take back home or share with their family, friends, and coworkers to take notice of April's Sexual Assault Awareness Month.

During the fair, Stacey Constante, RN, BSN, MSCN, discussed the mind-body connection and its relationship to trauma. She explained how stress responses affect the mind and highlighted the importance of holistic healing in survivors. Holistic healing can lead to trauma healing, improve the quality of life, and foster long-term resilience. Mrs. Constante covered several topics related to holistic healing, including practical exercises, emotional triggers, and meditation. NTU is grateful to Mrs. Constante for sharing her knowledge and providing resources for self-resilience.

Stacey stated, "The work being done to raise awareness in this community is beautiful. It serves as a shining example for all communities. I appreciate the efforts of everyone involved. They have been so helpful and kind. I hope this event continues every year so I can attend again."

Sheep Presentation Workshop

Crownpoint, NM - On April 4, 2024, the Navajo Technical University Vet Tech Land Grant program hosted this year's sheep presentation at the NTU Wellness Center. Jason Arviso opened the event, "This is the first vet tech program being offered, and we are making an impact in communities across the Navajo Nation. We are growing and have many students interning for us who want to learn and make changes."

Stacey Constant, a Ph.D. student at New Mexico State University, came out to Navajo Tech to present on reproducing the ewe in Ram. Sheep and ram owners from around the Navajo Reservation came out to learn and take notes on this important topic. Sarah discusses the male and female reproductive anatomy, how the ovarian structures produce hormones and control the reproductive cycles, Epididymis, BSE-External evaluation, semen evaluation, nutritional flushing, and other valuable topics on healthy ram and sheep breeding.

Dr. Marcy Ward, New Mexico state livestock specialist, also presented on vaccines, the do's and dont's, viral diseases, why booster shots are needed, and what to vaccinate for, such as leptospirosis, Q fever, chlamydia, and Vibriosis within your sheep and ram. Knowing how and where to vaccinate your wooley-running friends safely and effectively on their bodies is vital; Dr. Ward discussed executing these procedures through graphics and photos, saying, "Having someone with expertise to do these procedures for you is always recommended."

Dr. Germany Daye, Director of the Veterinary Teaching Hospital and Land Grant program said, "I am very excited to see such an excellent turnout, where people from all over the reservation got to get together to learn about herd health and other related topics. Especially seeing everyone participating and supporting one another at these events is very exciting. I look forward to seeing all of you out there."

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Shil Naholne': Literary Arts and Oral Stories Symposium

Albuquerque, NM - On April 8th and 9th, 2024, Navajo Technical University hosted a busy yet smooth event, the 2024 Literary Arts and Oral Stories Symposium, at the Isleta Resort and Casino. The university provided bags containing the symposium agenda, NTU merchandise, and brochures to all quests and speakers who arrived early to sign in.

Dr. Jennifer Wheeler commenced the Symposium by outlining what attendees could expect during the next two days of literary and poetry presentations. The event would feature insights into the methods and processes of various storytellers from different nations. This was followed by a blessing from Sharon Nelson, an NTU Lecturer specializing in Diné Studies, who offered a Navajo prayer for the start and end of the event to benefit all who were present.

During the event, guest speakers Dr. Laura Tohe and Sherwin Bitsui took the stage. Dr. Tohe shared her childhood experiences and the people who inspired her to become a writer. She also spoke about her awards, including a Navajo Nation medallion and an NTU shawl. Sherwin Bitsui read some of his poetry and short stories, while inspiring the audience. Both speakers have received numerous awards for their literary contributions.

Influential presenters were divided into groups during the conference and moved to different conference rooms to discuss various writing styles. Participants could learn about other topics such as The Morning as a Metaphor: Before the Poem Is a Poem by Jake Skeets, Writing for Our Culture: Running with Changing Woman by Lorinda Martinez, Diné stories from Dr. Jennifer Denetdale: What Do Archives Have to Do Dine' Storytelling? and many more from established writers who broke ground with their literature or poetry work.

Lyle J. Harvey from Rock Point, AZ, delivered a presentation on the solar eclipse, during which he emphasized the importance of observing the event with reverence. According to Harvey, avoiding eating, drinking, or engaging in activities during the eclipse is customary. Instead, the focus is on quiet reflection and respect, as the eclipse is a moment of rebirth. This approach is intended to provide an atmosphere of peace and tranquility, allowing members to appreciate the event's significance fully.



Dr. Wheeler emphasizes the experience at the Symposium, saying, "We also appreciate all those in attendance who decided to join us on an extraordinary and sacred day - during the solar eclipse. Concerning Diné teachings, we honored Jóhonaa'éí (Sun) and Tł'éhonaa'éí (Moon) by following cultural protocol and listening to stories and songs about the eclipse. These stories and songs also exemplify the importance of bilingualism, an element of the Symposium." After each session, Navajo Technical University's BFA Creative Writing program students would present autobiographies, stories, and recent works to guests and attendees.

Presenter Dr. Henry H. Fowler spoke the next day about Dii' Shaa Hane' in Diné bizaad. He shared his childhood stories and talked about living in the hogan and sheepherding. Guests enjoyed his performance of songs he learned while growing up in Tonalea, Arizona.

Dr. Fowler replied that he had an excellent experience by saying, "To hear the talents of Indigenous writers and storytellers inspired me. Indigenous life has been based on oral story-sharing, and this event truly touched on the rich oral stories from the presenters. I commend the committee members for their innovative vision that brings many talents together to exchange ideas and preserve the rich indigenous heritage through story-sharing."

During the break, conference attendees and speakers could mingle and discuss the topics presented while waiting for presenters to switch conference rooms. Door prizes were also distributed among the guests, and were delighted to receive exciting gifts.

The speakers' panel at this year's Symposium brought a new depth to storytelling. The stories featured were culturally rich and filled with language from Diné, Cherokee, Mvskoke Creek, and Laguna relatives. The Symposium committee honors and values our published writers and oral storytellers on behalf of National Poetry Month. This event offers an excellent opportunity to gather with relatives nearby and far away and share stories. "We often forget to slow down and appreciate where we come from due to our busy work, school, family, and daily routines. The Symposium allows us to do just that as we share stories around the fire," Dr. Wheeler said.

We look forward to seeing everyone again next year!" Dr. Agbaraji concluded.

Campus Tour for Two High Schools Visiting NTU

Brenda Yazzie, NTU recruiter, delivered a welcoming address and explained how the students could experience the entire university life at NTU. The group was divided into two to cover more ground. While walking around the campus, the high school students met NTU students who were busy attending classes or working on projects. This gave the students a glimpse of the rigorous academic environment at the university.

While enjoying their meal, Miss NTU showed up, spoke to the group, and answered their questions about her experience as an NTU student.

After lunch, the group split into three smaller groups led by Miss NTU, Jarvis Draper from the NTU Chinle campus, and Shawna Begay, Career Services Coordinator. The NTU staff and faculty led the students through the campus, showing them various classes, trades, and services that NTU offers. Many of the classes and trades they visited were in session, so they saw a typical day at NTU. The professors spoke with the groups and explained what the students were learning and what a degree in that field could do for them post-NTU. While touring, some students walking around the campus also spoke with the groups about their experiences at NTU and what made them choose the university.

NTU's Dual Credit program allows high school students to enroll in college-level courses offered by a college or university. These courses may be academic or career-technical and are optional or developmental. Through this program, students can simultaneously earn credit toward high school and a postsecondary degree or certificate.

Before the group left, they gathered back at the wellness center with the NTU athletic director, George LaFrance, who spoke about athletics at NTU and student-athletes' success in their sport and classroom. The group received NTU swag, which included helpful information on whether they wanted to enroll at Navajo Technical University.





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Narcan and HIV-STI Training

Crownpoint, NM— On April 22, 2024, the Substance Abuse Prevention Program of Navajo Technical University organized a free training session for Narcan at the Wellness Center. The event was attended by 43 staff members, faculty, students, and community members. The training aimed to raise awareness about the Opioid Epidemic, risk factors for overdose, harm reduction, and build the capacity of priority districts to lead district-level initiatives to increase the implementation of exemplary sexual health education, access to sexual health services, and safe and supportive environments.

Jacob LaCroix from the University of New Mexico, Nicole Lujan, and Brendon Mexican from the New Mexico Department of Health presented during the event. They shared their insights on the mentioned topics, answered questions, and addressed the audience's doubts.

There are some interesting facts about Narcan. Firstly, it can be given under the tongue if there's a blockage in the nose. Secondly, in the event of a suspected opioid overdose, New Mexico state law allows non-medical individuals to carry and use Narcan Nasal spray. However, it's important to note that even after administering Narcan, an individual can still overdose, and it's crucial to call 911. Naloxone is a medicine used to reverse opioid overdose.

The HIV-STI prevention program also aims to strengthen the state education agency's (SEA) capacity to provide leadership, guidance, and technical assistance to priority districts. The program also focuses on improving working relationships with strategic partners to achieve program impact and sustainability and enhance the Safe and Supportive Environments (SSE) for all students and staff.

Following the training session, all attendees were offered a free box of Narcan Nasal spray. NTU Security representative Derrick Perry reported that there have been no opioid overdoses at any NTU sites. Refreshments were provided for all participants.

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The Kirtland Listening Sessions for the Strategic Plan 2025-2030

Students, staff, and faculty from the NTU community shared their thoughts and opinions on what they would like to see from the Kirtland campus from 2025 to 2030.

NTU students, staff, and faculty expressed their desire for an established welding laboratory, dedicated full-time instructors and staff, easy access to financial aid representatives, an on-campus bookstore, and more facilities to bring the community together to grow, learn, and connect. These sessions were conducted to receive and take note of student, staff, and faculty concerns to enhance the Navajo Tech community university experience. The strategic plan formulated from these listening sessions aims to strengthen the culture and integrity of NTU, promote diversity within the community, and enhance the University with innovative programs over the next five years (2025-2030).

Ramondo Begaye is the new welding instructor at NTU's Kirtland campus. With over 44 years of experience in welding, having worked in power plants, and has been an AWS Certified Welding Inspector for 15 years. He brings a wealth of expertise to the institution. Ramondo said, "I have been an inspector for two years and a UA instructor since 2007. I am very privileged to work with my people. It has always been a dream after teaching in other parts of the region of the United States. I have lived what I am teaching and am helping the young ones in the right direction in their trades. Hopefully, it will inspire and encourage this trade. I would love to have the welding program in Kirtland to grow and prepare the students for their future."



NTU Featured Staff/Faculty

Dr. Abhishek RoyChowdhury is an Associate Professor of Environmental Science and Natural Resources at NTU. He joined NTU in 2019 and holds a BS in Biology and an MS in Environmental Science from the University of Calcutta, India. He earned his PhD in Environmental Management from Montclair State University, New Jersey, and worked as a Postdoctoral Fellow at Stevens Institute of Technology, New Jersey.

Dr. RoyChowdhury is an environmental clean-up and remediation expert, focusing on abandoned mine site remediation, water and wastewater treatment, and developing eco-friendly "green" approaches for treating heavy metals from contaminated soil and water. He has received funding for his ongoing research projects from USDA, NSF, NASA, U.S. Department of Interior-Office of Surface Mining and Reclamation Enforcement, U.S. Department of Interior-Bureau of Indian Affairs, Alfred P. Sloan Foundation, and First Americans Land-Grant Consortium. Since joining NTU, Dr. Roy Chowdhury has achieved several notable accolades.

Dr. RoyChowdhury incorporates laboratory and field activities in most of his courses to provide experimental learning. At NTU, he teaches students how to recognize and address environmental justice issues and generate sustainable solutions for their communities. His students have worked on projects including creating the first-ever community garden on campus, which grows Indigenous crops without chemicals, developing rainwater harvesting techniques, and implementing a campus-wide recycling plan.

Dr. RoyChowdhury is leading a joint initiative between Navajo Technical University and New Mexico Tech, the Navajo Nation Water Purification Project (N 4 WPP). The main objective of this project is to deploy cutting-edge water filtration technology in various locations to provide usable water to the Navajo Nation. These sites will also serve as training facilities for students to learn how to test water quality and maintain filtration units.
