Crownpoint, NM - On May 1, 2024, Navajo Technical University's Navajo History students, Rhiannon Guerro, Amythesis Marvin, Sheldon John, Tierra Todecheenie, Drakell Johnson, Loren Lee, and Malcolm Boyd, have not missed any classes and submitted all assignments.

Their final exams will cover the topics they've studied in the past eight weeks, including the Navajo Agencies, the Changing Times, the Treaty Years, and the Navajo's transition to the modern world with new technologies. Instructor Lupita Chicag's courses cover the essential figures who have significantly guided the Navajo community toward progress and Native American rights. For example, Lt. Edward Plummer's efforts to educate and prepare them for higher education are discussed. However, Chicag also delves into negative influences such as David Shimply, who forcibly took Navajo children and enrolled them in boarding schools.

The course includes discussions on Navajo history, such as when they were imprisoned and what happened to them. It also covers their return home and recognition, how they adopted English names, and how they integrated into modern society. The traders played a vital role in this transition by understanding the Navajo's needs and providing radio and socialization lessons through translation.

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

Counseling Intern Presentations



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HLC Approves NTU to Offer a Master's Degree in Industrial Engineering

CROWNPOINT, NM—On May 7, 2024, the Institutional Actions Council (IAC) of the Higher Learning Commission (HLC) approved NTU's request to offer a master's degree in Industrial Engineering. Navajo Technical University is committed to providing quality education to the Navajo Nation community and beyond.

Dr. Arup Dey stated, "That's great news! A huge thanks to Dr. Casmir Agbaraji and Dr. Wafa Hozien for their valuable support and guidance." After reviewing the information provided, HLC determined that the proposed degree program had sufficient information to meet notification requirements, and no further action was necessary.

Industrial Engineering is a branch of engineering that designs and improves integrated systems, including human resources, materials, equipment, and energy, using mathematics, physical sciences, and social sciences to maximize the production of goods and services.

"I would like to express my gratitude to Drs. Monsuru Ramoni and Arup Dey for their work on redesigning the existing 400-level courses and developing new 500-level IE courses," said Dr. Casmir Agbaraji, Dean of Undergraduate Studies at NTU." Due to their efforts, we received expedited approval without going through the entire HLC substantive application process."

To maximize efficiency, industrial engineers study product requirements carefully and then design manufacturing information systems using physical and mathematical models to meet those requirements. In addition, they develop management control systems to help in financial planning and cost analysis, and they design production planning and control systems to coordinate activities and ensure product quality.



Navajo Technical University is thrilled to introduce Cheryll Atine, the Substance Abuse Prevention Specialist at Navajo Technical University. Cheryll is not only a certified Alcohol and Drug Counselor II (ICADC) but also a certified Criminal Justice Professional (ICCJP). Her credentials include a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice Corrections/Law Enforcement from Weber State University. Originally from Provo, UT, after graduating Cheryll moved to Northern Nevada, raising her own family within the Te-Moak Tribe of Western Nevada - Shoshone Country.

Cheryll offers chemical dependency services, including outpatient care, inpatient referrals and follow-up, and aftercare. She also provides one-to-one counseling, referrals, and preventive education to individuals dealing with substance use. In addition, she conducts screenings and assessments for various mental health issues such as anxiety, depression, domestic violence, and substance abuse.

With more than 30 years of experience in substance abuse counseling, mental health, and suicide prevention, Cheryll has worked as a Substance Abuse Clinical Program Specialist at Elko Service Unit, Phoenix Area Indian Health Service, DDHS—Integrative Home Health Care Outpatient Facility, Elko, NV, and as a Mental Health Counselor and Consultant at the Elko County Sheriff Department & Juvenile Teen Court.

Cheryll is excited that, after numerous workshops and sessions on suicide awareness in 2020, Suicide Awareness Training became a mandatory training at NTU's campuses. Cheryll also created a list of resources for each location, including Crownpoint Main Campus, Chinle, and Zuni.

Her volunteer work includes Board Director for the New Mexico National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) 2021-2023, as well as being a member of the San Juan County, NM, NAMI. NAMI New Mexico is an organization that supports families, friends, and individuals affected by mental illness, with the primary goal of advocating for better lives for those with mental illness. In addition, Cheryll volunteers for the American Red Cross as part of the Disaster Action Team (DAT), helping and responding to emergencies such as fires, storms, and other disasters.
