This exercise aimed to foster stronger relationships by offering suggestions, analysis, and agreement or disagreement with one another. Ultimately, this experience aimed to facilitate self-reflection and improve our listening and communication skills.

Through the teachings of Nitsáhákees (thinking), Nahátá (planning), Īína (implementing), and Siihasin (reflection), students acquire quality education in diverse fields while preserving cultural values and gaining economic opportunities.



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Six NTU Engineering and Technology programs receive extended ABET accreditation

Crownpoint, NM—Navajo Technical University was granted ABET accreditation for its Advanced Manufacturing Engineering Technology (AMET), Chemical Engineering Technology (ChET), Electrical Engineering (EE), Engineering Technology (ET), Industrial Engineering (IE), and Information Technology (IT) programs. The accreditation recognizes and ensures that the programs meet industry standards required of all graduates entering the workforce. The university continues strengthening its programs and actively seeks more accreditations for its Computer Science, Environmental, and Mechanical Engineering programs.

"We have been eagerly building our technical programs that produce students who not only graduate with degrees but also attain the most current knowledge needed in all areas of STEM," said Dr. Casmir Agbaraji, NTU Dean of Undergraduate Studies, "NTU's Engineering and hard sciences are significant to our institution as they are proactive in research and improvements in our Navajo communities."

For any university, the ABET accreditation is the hallmark of quality and high standards for its engineering or STEM programs. 2018, the university first obtained ABET accreditation for its Electrical (EE) and Industrial (IE) engineering programs, extending retroactively to 2015. The programs have seen much interest and continue to play an extensive role as the university's top programs.

In 2029, the university will continue to seek more accreditations for its Computer Science (CS), Environmental Engineering (ENVE), and Mechanical Engineering (ME) programs. As the engineering programs grow, students participate in community activities that also provide them with hands-on projects. Students from the environmental sciences took part in a research project on Pinon Jaybird Flocks.

The ABET accreditation ensures that students in the engineering and technology programs at NTU are gaining the industry standards necessary to prepare for STEM fields and the workforce. NTU continues to improve its STEM fields where students can gain hands-on and theoretical applications. The university offers 40 STEM programs and 3 Graduate degrees in Engineering and Technology.

NASA Visits with Navajo Technical University Science Students

Crownpoint, New Mexico - On September 19, 2024, Dr. Robert Swap and Steve Platnick from Mission Planning in the Earth Sciences at NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center visited Navajo Technical University to discuss their department's work. They discussed new technology, current projects, potential collaborations with NTU, and opportunities for students to understand the land and the globe. The presentation focused on the United States, specifically extreme weather, climate change, and biomass burning issues.


Dr. Robert Swap is known for his science diplomacy and servant leadership work. He has held academic and governmental leadership positions in collaborative research and education in emerging regions, particularly subequatorial Africa and Brazil. He is often invited to share his expertise on international partnerships, engaged pedagogies, servant leadership, and Science Diplomacy at universities and institutions such as AAAS, TWAS, and the UN.

Steven Platnick's research includes theoretical and experimental studies on satellite, aircraft, and ground-based cloud remote sensing. He has been extensively involved in remote sensing field studies, including using the MODIS Airborne Simulator instrument flown on the NASA ER-2 and playing flight scientist roles in several field campaigns. He is a MODIS and S-NPP Atmosphere Science Team member, working on operational cloud optical and microphysical products and serving as the MODIS Atmosphere Team Lead.

They also discussed future activities relevant to the region, including the Adaptation & Resilience In Drylands (ARID) Scoping Study and the West-coast Heartland Hyperspectral Microwave Sounder Intensive Experiment (WH2yMSIE).

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Navajo Nation Law and Order Committee

Crownpoint, NM – On September 23, 2024, Navajo Technical University hosted the Navajo Nation Law and Order Committee meeting of the 25th Navajo Nation Council inside the Hospitality Center. Committee members and the NTU community gathered to discuss developments and identify the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act.

Dr. Collen Bowman updated the collaboration with the Navajo Nation Police Academy. NTU supports the police academy on the Chinle campus, offering classroom space and facility usage for training their students who are ready to enter the Navajo Nation Law Enforcement. Our entire academic program takes our students through the programs, helping them explore different fields within law enforcement, especially here in the Navajo Nation. NTU Vice President Jason Arviso provided an update on the missing and murdered Dine Relatives database project, which provided precise data for the university and highlighted that we are also collaborating with other colleges and universities.

The Associate of Arts degree in Criminal Justice will provide a pathway for Navajo Police Officers with a Navajo Technical University certificate in Law Enforcement and better prepare those officers to compete for front-line supervisory positions. This is an opportunity for non-Navajo Police Department officers to obtain an education in law enforcement, preparing them for various law enforcement and regulatory compliance positions in the Navajo Nation and at the county, state, tribal, and federal levels.

The Strategic Plan 2025-2030 Listening Sessions

Chinle, AZ – On September 11, 2024, Navajo Technical University outlines its goals for the entire university community every four years. To enhance the students' experience at NTU, Listening Sessions have been scheduled to receive feedback from the stakeholders.

The listening sessions were held in person and on Zoom. Participants included students, staff, and faculty from instructional sites in Crownpoint, NM; Kirtland, NM; Teec Nos Pos, AZ; and Zuni, NM. The purpose of these sessions was to collect feedback on the identified goals. Based on the information collected, the established priorities included the development of instructional sites, infrastructure, and financial services. The plan's significance was determined by considering the feedback received from the Chinle campus and the surrounding communities that NTU serves.

The University's administrators are committed to involving all stakeholders in updating its Strategic Priorities and setting an example of an inclusive planning process. This is a part of NTU's ongoing comprehensive strategic planning cycle.

This strategic plan has been formulated to strengthen NTU's culture and integrity, promote diversity within our community, and enhance the University with a range of innovative programs that will guide us over the next five years (2025-2030).



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NTU Featured Staff/Faculty

In 1999, Chef Robert Witte faced challenges when he joined our campus community. He had only three students, a recipe book for a text, and operated on a budget of around \$50. The program was confined to a small kitchen for instructional space, which became overcrowded as enrollment grew from three students to 25.

To accommodate the growing program, Chef Bob worked with Dr. Guy to secure state funds to build a new culinary arts and hospitality building. This new facility was equipped with professional-standard kitchen space, three hotel rooms, and an open hospitality room for catering. With the additional space, Chef Bob could also revise the program's curriculum to align with ACF standards, achieving certification in 2012.

Chef Bob's efforts have made NTU the only higher Indigenous Learning Institution accredited through the American Culinary Federation. The program has grown to over 150 students and now offers certificate and associate degrees in Culinary Arts and Commercial Baking, as well as a Bachelor of Applied Science in Hotel and Restaurant Administration, created in conjunction with the business program.

In 2022, Chef Bob secured exemplary status for NTU's Culinary Arts program, recognizing the highest educational standards by the American Culinary Federation Education Foundation Accrediting Commission (ACFEFAC). Executive Chef Robert Witte was one of four chefs selected for the Distinguished Chef Series at Benchmark Hospitality Inc. in Woodland, Texas. At the event, Chef Witte created a variety of dishes that blended Native American and Southwestern cuisine.

Chef Robert L. Witte, CEC, CCA, AAC, received the Presidential Medallion, the highest honor given by the President of the American Culinary Federation at the American Culinary Federation's National Convention in New Orleans, in 2023.

Chef Robert L. Witte was presented in recognition of the outstanding representation of the ACF's fundamental principles, including superior strength of character and continued contributions to ACF and the culinary industry. Chef Witte has had a distinguished career at NTU, contributing to the university's growth and the Navajo Nation over the past twenty years.
