CROWNPOINT, NM - On January 6, 2025, the 2025 Eastern Navajo Nation Inauguration took place at the Navajo Technical University Wellness Center in Crownpoint, NM.

Dr. Guy, NTU President, Honors the Legacy of Dr. Charles "Monty" Roessel

Crownpoint, NM – Navajo Technical University (NTU) joins Diné College and the Navajo Nation in mourning the profound loss of Dr. Charles "Monty" Roessel, a leader in Navajo education who passed away peacefully on Monday, January 6, 2025.

Dr. Guy, President of NTU, issued the following statement:

"Today, we honor the life and legacy of Dr. Charles 'Monty' Roessel. Monty was among the most respected tribal college leaders in the United States.

Monty's parents, Robert and Ruth Roessel, were among the Navajo leaders who founded Navajo Community College (now Dinè College), the first tribal college in the country. Dinè College jump-started the tribally controlled higher education movement, transforming Indigenous education worldwide. When Monty assumed the college's presidency, he brought this sense of historic importance with him and progressive thought that has benefitted the Navajo people and their long-term future.

Monty's dedication transformed Diné College and inspired countless students; his passion for education innovation and cultural preservation empowered the Navajo Nation and extended far beyond the college. He was a true Nataani.

As the President of Navajo Technical University, I feel like the world is a different place as yet another great tribal leader passes. Leaders as significant as Monty are rare and should always be valued. I have always considered Monty a friend and a colleague, and I cannot express how much I believe that all Navajo and the tribal college and university movement nationwide will miss him.

Dr. Roessel's legacy is one of hope and achievement. His work strengthened Diné College and the entire network of tribal colleges and universities nationwide. His vision and commitment to our shared values of K'é and education as a pathway to sovereignty will forever inspire us.

On behalf of NTU, I offer my deepest condolences to his family, friends, and all he touched. We stand in solidarity with Diné College and the Roessel family, honoring a leader whose legacy will endure."

Navajo Technical University Team Named Phase 1 Winner in the U.S. Department of Energy American-Made TCU Energy and Food Sovereignty Nexus Prize

Washington, DC – On January 8, 2024, the NTU Environmental Science team was awarded \$40,000 for their plan to increase renewable energy and food sovereignty on campus. Navajo Technical University has been recognized as the winner of the U.S. Department of Energy American-Made TCU Energy and Food Sovereignty Nexus Prize!

Special thanks to the Food Sovereignty & Energy Nexus on the Navajo Land team, consisting of Dr. Abhishek RoyChowdhury, Darlene Wilson, Davina Spencer, and Christine Whitehorse, for developing a winning submission. This team has developed a project plan to enhance the campus garden that Environmental Science students have cultivated from scratch over the past two years. The garden has flourished with various crops, and the team aims to revitalize the connection between the Navajo people and their land by promoting food sovereignty and sustainable agriculture. They accomplish this by integrating Traditional Ecological Knowledge (TEK), modern sustainable technologies, and community education at Navajo Technical University. Their efforts foster healthy communities and contribute to a resilient future within the Navajo Nation.

Under the guidance of Dr. RoyChowdhury, students participate in community workshops that focus on planting and irrigation techniques within the university garden. The project employs traditional Navajo farming methods, harvests rainwater, and incorporates solar-powered irrigation systems. Dr. Roychowdhury expressed gratitude, stating, "This is a huge motivation for our students, department, and the NTU family. Thank you, everyone, for your unwavering support of our department and students."

Each Phase 1 winner's TCU received a \$40,000 cash prize for their outstanding work. The Food Sovereignty & Energy Nexus on Navajo Land team and other Phase 1 winners will now advance to Phase 2a. In this phase, they will complete all necessary pre-work and obtain permits for the construction of their project, competing for a chance to win an additional \$75,000 cash award before building their project.

Registered Nursing Blessing Ceremony and Orientation

Crownpoint, NM - Navajo Technical University announced the launch of the Registered Nurse Program on January 14, 2025, including the Program Orientation afternoon session for RN students.

Dr. Cristina Carpenter, the Interim Director of the RN Program, introduced herself and several new faculty and team members in the hospitality room. The Nursing Program at NTU has faced challenges in maintaining operations, which include securing approval from the New Mexico State Board of Nursing, the Higher Learning Commission, and the NTU Faculty. The 78-credit program is designed to be completed over four to five semesters, after which students will be prepared to serve their communities.

In recent years, Dr. Michelle Kahn John, now serving as the RN Program Consultant, along with the administration, faculty, and staff at Navajo Technical University, has worked diligently to reopen the Nursing Program.

The Nursing Program faculty presented nursing kits to the students who had already been admitted. Enrollment in the registered nurse (RN) program marks the beginning of training designed for future registered nurses. Mr. Anson Etsitty, Sr. from Many Farms, AZ, offered a traditional blessing. He began the ceremony with a cleansing prayer inside the hospitality building. The event also included songs, prayers, and a lunch for attendees.

Dr. Carpenter introduced the guest speaker, Dr. Adriann Begay, who spoke about the importance of healthcare. She is mentoring fellows based in the Navajo Nation through Health, Equity, Action & Leadership (HEAL). Dr. Begay worked for the Indian Health Service for 21 years, initially at Salt River Clinic under the Phoenix Indian Medical Center and then for four years as a primary care provider. She also served as an urgent care physician and administrator at Gallup Indian Medical Center for 17 years. Her career is dedicated to improving healthcare for American Indians and Alaskan Natives (AI/AN), focusing on increasing the pipeline of AI/AN students who can return to their communities to provide care.





New Student Spring Orientation 2025

Crownpoint, NM—On Thursday, January 16, 2025, Navajo Technical University (NTU) hosted its New Student Orientation for incoming students beginning the spring semester inside the Wellness Center. 

Michael and his team wish all NTU students a successful and fulfilling semester, and they extend their heartfelt thanks to everyone who contributed to making the event such a success.



Her maternal grandparents are from the Kinlichii'nii clan, and her paternal grandparents are from the Tachii'nii clan. She resides in Crownpoint, NM, but is originally from Ahwatukee, AZ. Twila was educated in the Kyrene School District in West Chandler, AZ, and graduated from Mountain Pointe High School, home of the Pride.

In 2013, Twila moved back to Crownpoint to live with her sister because she missed the Navajo culture. With the encouragement of her family and parents, she enrolled at Navajo Technical University to study in the early childhood multicultural education program. However, wanting to help others, she quickly transferred to the School of Business.

While at the university, Twila interned as an administrative assistant under George LaFrance, the Athletics Director. She gained valuable experience during this internship, noting, "He taught me how to manage events, understand the attendees, and guide them around campus." Since then, Twila has embraced a healthy lifestyle and encourages other students to do the same through sports and workouts.

She was an active secretary in the Student Senate, taking detailed notes on key points, decisions, action items, and essential discussions during meetings. Twila ensured a record of what was discussed and identified who was responsible for each task, effectively capturing critical information, including student concerns. Twila remarked, "The difficult part was balancing work, parenting, and being a student. Being part of the team and receiving that recognition was good enough for me."

In the spring of 2006, Sheena Begay began her journey at the Crownpoint Institute of Technology (CIT) in Crownpoint, New Mexico, during a transformative period for the institution.


Sheena pursued a major in law advocacy and earned an associate's degree. Coming from a rural area of the Navajo Nation located between Rough Rock and Chilchinbeto, Arizona, she was already familiar with remote living. Raised in a home without indoor plumbing or electricity, her family—which included her parents and nine siblings—relied on hauling water for their daily needs and livestock. The nearest town with essential services was an hour away, giving her a newfound appreciation for the conveniences in her CIT dorm room, where even a tiny refrigerator brought her joy.

Sheena graduated from the University of New Mexico (UNM) in 2013 and embraced motherhood while contributing to Navajo Technical University's (NTU) growth. In the fall of 2024, she earned her Master's in Management Information Systems from NTU with a 4.0 GPA.

As the Director of Institutional Data and Reporting, Sheena emphasizes the importance of data-driven decision-making across the university. "Data has become an indispensable tool for shaping strategic initiatives and enhancing outcomes," she stated. She welcomes data requests and believes that identifying issues is crucial for driving positive change.

One major project involved analyzing NTU's persistence, retention, and graduation rates to improve student completion rates. Utilizing Jenzabar for data extraction and Excel for analysis, Sheena organizes data into customized department sheets, allowing her to identify trends and insights for stakeholders.
