### NTU Fresh Produce Food Distribution with La Planta Organization

Crownpoint, NM – On June 6, 2025, Navajo Technical University and La Planta organization once again partnered to host a free fresh produce distribution event, their third collaboration on the NTU main campus. This community-focused effort was made possible through the dedication of NTU Peer Navigators Kory Begay and Tamalaya Begaye, who sincerely thank La Planta for its continued support in supplying fresh produce for each event.

The distribution was open to the public, and community members turned out in significant numbers and were encouraged to take as much produce as needed. The event began at 10:00 a.m. in the Wellness Center parking lot, where participants were first asked to complete a short survey before proceeding through various food stations staffed by NTU volunteers.

Various produce was available, including potatoes, dragon fruit, red beets, onions, baby carrots, green beans, Brussels sprouts, lettuce, broccoli, bell peppers, and more. The distribution continued until supplies were depleted around 3:30 p.m.

The NTU Peer Navigators would like to thank everyone from the NTU community who volunteered their time to help ensure the event ran smoothly. This marks the third successful collaboration between NTU and La Planta, both of whom remain committed to providing fresh, healthy produce to support the well-being of our local community.





#### **NTU Innovation Center Hosts Open House**

Church Rock, NM — On June 13, 2025, Navajo Technical University's Innovation Center (NTIC) welcomed community members, entrepreneurs, students, and dignitaries to an immersive open house to spotlight its comprehensive business development resources and the local enterprises it nurtures.

A certified business incubator by the State of New Mexico Economic Development Department, NTIC supports emerging businesses through tailored services and amenities. Housed within its 7,000 sq ft gated facility are nine furnished office suites and shared spaces—including a conference room, computer lab, kitchen, and high-speed internet—offering everything businesses need to thrive.

Guests at the open house discovered how NTIC works to innovate, integrate, and accelerate by blending Navajo culture with modern business practices. The Center offers free workshops—from accounting to marketing—reduced-rent offices and production areas and support services like mentorship, technical assistance, and event space rentals.

NTIC Director Matt Tafoya emphasized the Center's mission saying, "This open house is about celebrating innovation, entrepreneurship, and the power of community. We want people to see the support systems we've built here and meet the businesses that are turning ideas into action."

Wilbur Tso from NTU served as emcee, and vendors included Tea Boss, Diné Coffee Co., and the Diné Chamber of Commerce.

Navajo Nation Vice President Richelle Montoya praised NTIC's role, "It's inspiring to witness the collaboration and creativity happening here. The NTU Innovation Center is a true example of how we can uplift our communities through entrepreneurship and cultural knowledge."

Diné Chamber of Commerce Chairperson Marvina Pete stated, "We're proud to work alongside NTIC to support business owners across the Navajo Nation. Events like this help strengthen connections and empower growth."

With its combination of business training, cultural integration, and community-driven facilities, the Innovation Center continues its commitment to diversity, economic resilience, and sustainable growth for the Navajo Nation.

### NTU Rodeo Member Qualifies for the Collegiate National Finals Rodeo

Casper, WY—On June 15, 2025, the Navajo Technical University Rodeo Team participated in the College National Finals Rodeo (CNFR) at the Ford Wyoming Center in Casper, WY, from June 15 to 24, 2025.


Isaiah Tom, representing Navajo Technical University and hailing from Vanderwagen, New Mexico, prepared for the biggest performance of the season. This will be Isaiah's second time qualifying for the CNFR in the Bareback Riding event. He has been named Athlete of the Week for Central Arizona College in Casa Grande. He also won the 2025 Year-End Bareback Championship in Prescott, Arizona, receiving a custom saddle for placing first in the regional finals rodeo.

Isaiah confidently demonstrated his bareback riding skills on the exciting opening day. He completed round one with a solid performance but faced a challenging turn, resulting in a low score of 60 points. Despite this setback, he showed optimism and determination, confronting the unfortunate experience of being bucked off his horse.

When asked about going head-to-head to become a national champion in bareback riding, Isaiah said, "The Lord gave me a second chance, and I thank him for giving me another opportunity to come here again. This year, I have more confidence in myself than last. And I give my Lord and savior Jesus Christ the praise."

"Before any rodeo starts, we give our respects to the Lord and our Nation. We can do all things through Christ. The sport of rodeo is a lifestyle to most of us, and it feels good to be back in Casper. Isaiah is a blessed Cowboy. I fully support his talent. Working toward a goal all school year and then reaching that goal is a good feeling. Getting to this arena is one thing, but we've got a new goal that we've set. Time to go to work and stay focused. Thank you to the people who support NTU Rodeo," said Coach Nicole Pino.

To conclude the college rodeo season, he captured the long and short gorounds and was crowned the average champion.



#### **NTU Men's Skyhawks Host Competitive Basketball Tryouts**

Crownpoint, NM — From June 16 to 18, student-athletes from across the region gathered at Navajo Technical University (NTU) to compete for a spot on the Men's Skyhawks Basketball Team. Led by Head Coach Michael McMillan and supported by current team players, the tryouts pushed each participant to their limits, testing their endurance, skill, and determination.

Coach McMillan, a member of the Mississippi Band of Choctaw Indians, focused on identifying athletes ready to compete at the collegiate level. The three-day tryout featured a variety of drills that tested shooting accuracy, ball handling, quick decision-making, and in-game awareness. Players were evaluated in scrimmage settings to measure their performance under pressure. In addition to athletic ability, Coach McMillan emphasized the importance of teamwork, coachability, and a positive attitude.

"We had 24 high school athletes try out for the upcoming season," said Coach McMillan. "Each athlete brought great energy and talent to the court, and it was a tough decision. In the end, I selected 10 athletes who I believe will contribute to the success of our program. We're excited for the season and hope to see the community out supporting the Skyhawks at our games."

Coach McMillan resides in Crownpoint, NM, with his wife Joycilene and their children, Amaya, Kordell, and Miley.

Excelling as a STEM lab tutor and IT intern, he implemented key improvements, such as transitioning NTU's email system to a secure online platform. After earning his associate degree in computer science, he contributed further to NTU as a system administrator and student senate member, where he met his wife, Sheena Begay.

After receiving their associates, Dody and Sheena wanted go further, they wrote a proposal to the president of NTU, Dr. Elmer Guy, and the board of directors to establish NTU's bachelor's program in computer science, enabling students to pursue advanced education locally.
