Culinary Arts Fall 2025 Finals

Crownpoint, NM — On December 2, 2025, the NTU Culinary Arts Program began its fall semester final examinations. Each semester, second-semester culinary arts students are required to plan, prepare, cook, and serve a six-course meal for five guests inside the Hospitality House. To support the process, each second-semester student is paired with a first-semester student who assists with meal preparation.

One student, Kiana, was supported throughout the meal by her first-semester assistant. She was responsible for creating an appetizer, soup, salad, fish course, entrée, and a dessert prepared tableside.

For every course served, Kiana also presented her dish to the guests, offering a brief overview and explanation. She was assigned a set of required ingredients and tasked with developing a menu that incorporated each of them into at least one course. A highlight many guests anticipate each semester is the tableside dessert service, where the student explains the dish's history and performs a bit of flambé showmanship.

The final student of the semester, Santae, was tasked with planning, preparing, cooking, and serving a six-course meal for six guests in the Hospitality Center, with Elley assisting throughout the process. Santae's six-course menu began with Deviled Egg Steak Bites, followed by a Salad with Fig Balsamic Vinaigrette, Butternut Squash Soup, and Maple-Glazed Salmon.

The entrée featured a Duck Roulade, and dessert was prepared tableside: Crêpe Suzette with Cinnamon Honey Ice Cream. Santae made excellent use of the preparation time, sending dishes out of the kitchen at a steady and consistent pace. She personally presented each course, giving guests a brief overview of every dish before it was served.

Professional Baking Basic, I, & II Finals

Crownpoint, NM - On December 4, 2024, the NTU Professional Baking Program conducted its final exams in the multi-purpose building on the NTU main campus.

As part of the curriculum, students in advanced baking classes showcased their skills by preparing various desserts, such as cakes, macarons, fondant, tar dough, and eclairs.

Students also served a tableside dessert, often in the presence of NTU faculty, staff, family, and invited supporters. They were assessed on dish quality, kitchen execution, and their ability to explain the dish's background, sometimes performing flambé demonstrations.

Technical Instructor of Baking, Melvina Jones, stated that standard procedures for each batch include checking ingredient conditions, following recipe instructions, and evaluating the final product's quality.

Each student recognized all key aspects, including the use of high-quality equipment and an understanding of the science behind ingredients and baking methods. After grading, these desserts were available for the NTU community to sample.



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2025 Professional Baking III Fall Finals

Crownpoint, NM — On December 4, 2025, the Professional Baking III Program presented final projects from two students who spent several weeks preparing their displays.

Bryton Sewequeqtewa and Keanu Simpson displayed their respective projects, including a wedding cake and complementary desserts of their choosing. These works showcased the skills and techniques they developed throughout the semester.

The NTU community was invited to the Multipurpose Building to view the students' creations before enjoying the desserts. Bryton's three-tier "Dinosaur theme" wedding cake featured a chocolate layer with espresso pastry cream, a vanilla layer with layered pastry cream, and a strawberry layer with pastry. He selected this design for its familiarity and confidence in baking, decorating it with Italian buttercream and marshmallow fondant. The sides were adorned with macarons, eclairs, and mini tarts.

Keanu, aiming for simplicity, crafted a four-tier wedding cake with Italian buttercream, raspberry jam, and edible gold to better manage his time after preparing additional items: dark chocolate truffles, mini fruit tarts, mini eclairs, and Italian macarons.

Sheila Begay, the Technical Instructor of Baking III, explained that the assessment was hands-on, covering everything from baking the perfect sponge to creating smooth ganache and detailed floral decorations for a polished final piece.



Navajo Technical University offers a Veterinary Technology Program

This Spring 2026, NTU will offer a comprehensive selection of Veterinary Technology and Animal Science courses at the Crownpoint campus, featuring hands-on labs, clinical rotations, and real-world experience through the university's interactive teaching hospital.

NTU remains committed to preparing the next generation of veterinary professionals to serve their communities, livestock industries, and regional animal health.
